Each year at this time I am reminded of the appreciation I have for serving our school community as your superintendent. This year, our students have generously dedicated service hours across the district, well ahead of our Senior Service Day in May. In a heartwarming holiday initiative, groups including the Student Council, Jackson School for the Arts, Jackson Academy for Global Studies, and others, came together to provide clothing and gifts for 106 local families, touching the lives of approximately 500 individuals.



The funds for this project were raised by our Student Council through the homecoming dance. They successfully gathered resources to purchase

essential clothing, warm gear, gift cards, and toys for families in need during the holiday season. This endeavor, which begins well before the holidays, has been made possible through the dedicated efforts of our district and school leadership teams. We are immensely grateful for the hard work invested in supporting our students and families.

Of course, we would be remiss if we did not take this opportunity to thank our Jackson community for its support of Issue 30, a renewal levy (no new taxes) that provides our district with about \$6 million in revenue. We are fortunate at Jackson Local to have a community that backs our schools.

Our commitment to responsible stewardship of the resources entrusted to us remains a top priority. According to the Ohio Department of Education's Cupp Report, Jackson Local Schools stands as the most efficient district in administrative, instructional, and overall per-pupil costs among 20 comparable districts in Ohio.

ARTS & ATHLETIC PERFORMANCES

We are almost halfway through the 2023-2024 school year. Our second quarter ends on Jan. 11 after winter break. Since the start of the school year, it has been an inspiration to watch our students perform in the classroom, on the stage, or athletic fields and courts. The Jackson School for the Arts production of *Newsies* was superb. While the acting, singing, dancing, and music were wonderful, the set design on our stage certainly was something to take in. Bravo to all involved.

The Purple Army Marching Band self-funded a trip to Hawaii and performed at Pearl Harbor over Thanksgiving. What a great enrichment opportunity for our students. This was the back end of a yearlong military appreciation program from our Arts Academy that started last November with the production of *White Christmas*. Watching our talented students perform never ceases to amaze me, but it is always impressive to see the amount of talent being cultivated from within our hallways.


Our athletic teams are off to a great start this winter season in boys and girls basketball, bowling, swimming and diving, wheelchair basketball, wrestling, gymnastics, and competitive cheerleading. And this is on the heels of another state championship! Congratulations are in order for our boys cross country team, led by head coach Kevin Walsh, for winning the Division I state championship. This is our school's fifth state title (two each in boys basketball and baseball). The way our cross country team finished that race is the epitome of our school district: They got better as the race progressed and they had an incredibly strong finish!

In conclusion, I extend my congratulations to all involved in these achievements and thank our community for their unwavering support. Together, we continue to foster excellence and pride in Jackson Local Schools.

Boys Cross Country Team Wins State Championship



The Jackson High School boys cross country team won the Division I state championship to close out the season in November. The Polar Bears won the title with an impressive team score of 86 points, well ahead of second-place Mason with 148 points. Olentangy Orange finished third with 172 points and St. Xavier was fourth with 178.

This is the first title in the history of the cross country program, and it came with a bit of drama to end the meet in a flurry for the Polar Bears. Jackson was trailing Mason by three points heading into the last mile of the race and rallied for the impressive 62-point win. Mason was the defending two-time state champions. Polar Bear junior Eli Ilg set another school record (14:59.7) and became the highest-finishing Jackson male runner in school history as he finished second. Senior Elliot Zuckett and Eli both earned First Team All-Ohio honors as Elliot placed 25th with a time of 15:48. Jackson had four runners finish in the top 50 (Ilg and Zuckett) with Will Prato (15:59) coming in 37th and Cael Ball (16:10) 49th. Sean McNulty (16:16) finished 57th, Carter Hull (16:19) finished 65th, and Andrew Huzyak (16:55) 123rd.

This is head coach Kevin Walsh's first state title in 29 years of coaching.

This historic win for Jackson High School's cross country team is a testament to their hard work, dedication, and unrelenting spirit. It is a victory that will be celebrated and remembered for years to come in the halls of Jackson High.

The 2023-2024 Jackson Local Board of Education members have met two times this school year. The members are: Board President Christopher Goff, Esq., Vice President Tonya Wright, Lia Jones, Esq., Thomas Winkhart, Esq., and Scott Gindlesberger.



CHRISTOPHER GOFF began his first term in January 2008 and has been re-elected three times. He holds a bachelor of science degree in business administration, with a major in finance from Ohio Northern University, a master's degree in political science from The University of Akron, and a juris doctor from The University of Akron School of Law. He is CEO and General Counsel at Employers Health and is a former adjunct professor of law at The University of Akron School of Law, and currently is an adjunct professor at Northeast Ohio Medical School. Mr. Goff and his wife have three adult children who have graduated from Jackson Local Schools.

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
Classroom Amplification Systems

The Jackson Local School District, and Lake Cable Elementary School specifically, were the recipients of a generous grant from the Quota International of Massillon Club received via the Austin Bailey Foundation. The foundation awarded the Massillon Club a \$25,100 grant to purchase 20 classroom amplification systems for classrooms at Lake Cable.

These systems enhance learning in the classroom by enabling students to hear teachers clearly. The teacher wears a wireless microphone that connects to a speaker system in the classroom. When the teacher speaks, it is as if he or she is standing next to each child to hear her.

Children who can hear and understand what is being said tend to learn better. Research has shown how effective these systems are in improving learning in the classroom.

The club has been dedicated to providing classroom amplification systems for over 20 years. The Quota International of Massillon Club has placed over 350 systems in Western Stark County schools.



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



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
Jackson Local seeks to serve students with disabilities



Within the intent of the federal statutes (Rehabilitation Act of 1973-section 504 and Individuals with Disabilities Education Act IDEA-public law 105-17), the Jackson Local School District continues its effort to locate and identify children with disabilities from birth through age 21. Children with disabilities have physical, emotional, and/or mental impairments that may require special education. Public schools provide free and appropriate education regardless of a child's disability. However, before these children can be served, they must be found. Many of these children are not visible because

they may not function in the community's mainstream, and many are preschoolers. Parents may not realize that programs and services are available through their school district or from agencies in their community.
