drivers responded in kind with a chorus of horns honking.



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
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ACT Perfection!

Jackson High School's **Vivian Janes** (daughter of Derek and Tammy Janes) accomplished a rare feat this year when the senior scored a perfect ACT score. ACT tests are administered periodically throughout the school year and are used by many colleges as one of the factors during the admissions process. How rare is a perfect 36?

Vivian joins the ranks of the top one-quarter of 1% of ACT test-takers who have achieved perfection.

Last year, of 1.34 million students who took the ACT, only 3,376 individuals claimed the perfect score. Vivian's achievement is a testament to her commitment to excellence and a bright future.

Jackson is among the best school districts in the county in getting students college-ready.

Janet Godwin, CEO of ACT, said of Vivian's achievement: "Earning a top score on the ACT is remarkable. A student's exceptional score of 36 will provide any college or university with ample evidence of their readiness for the academic rigors that lie ahead."

The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science, each scored on a scale of 1-36. A student's composite score is the average of the four test scores. The ACT's optional writing test score is reported separately and is not included within the ACT composite score.

The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement exam that measures what students have learned in school. Students who earn a 36 composite score have likely mastered all of the skills and knowledge needed to succeed in first-year college courses in the core subject areas.


With this state-level win, Aarit has qualified for the National Civics Bee, where he will compete against the best and brightest nationwide.

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Eagle Scout Project





Tristan Dennis, a 2023 graduate of Jackson High School, earned his Boy Scouts of America Eagle Scout rank. He is a member of BSA Troop 118. His Eagle Scout project "Folds of the Flag" involved constructing 13 shadow boxes containing each flag fold with a plaque explaining what each fold represents. Each Box lights up and is displayed on the gazebo ceiling at the Ohio



Seal of Biliteracy awarded

The Ohio Department of Education recently recognized the World Languages teachers at Jackson High School for a No. 7-ranking in the state for students who have earned the prestigious Seal of Biliteracy. World Languages course offerings at the middle school level make it possible for Jackson Local students to study French or Chinese for up to 5 years and Spanish for up to 6 years. A dedicated, passionate team of educators across two schools closely coordinate instruction so that students can acquire cultural and linguistic competence.



The Seal of Biliteracy is conferred upon graduating seniors who can demonstrate high levels of proficiency in English and at least one other language, an accolade that ensures students' biliteracy skills are easily identifiable by colleges, universities, military recruiters and future employers.

Since 2018, Jackson has been awarded 146 Seals in Spanish, French and Chinese. In addition, 23 graduating seniors from the class of 2023 have already earned the seal, while others await their qualifying scores.
