Spring has finally arrived, and with it comes great news about the many athletic and academic accomplishments our students made during the long, snowy winter.

Student Achievement

Numerous music students at the high school, middle school and elementary levels performed in esteemed honors ensembles throughout the state. Medical, automotive, carpentry and culinary students competed at state, and JMMS had many first, second and third place victories in the Stark County Math Tournament.

Two JMMS athletic teams and almost half of our high school teams won Federal League titles. Girls' Golf and Volleyball finished second in the state, and we had 11 regional qualifying teams. Girls' Basketball advanced to Regional competition for the first time in 37 years and also earned the 5th highest academic ranking in the state (all schools/all divisions) with a team GPA of 3.925.

It's not always about the academic award or athletic trophy. Jackson students know that achievements are important but hard work pays off no matter where you land on the ladder of success. We teach students that a strong work ethic and a determination to succeed will lead to many great opportunities in life.

Jackson would not succeed without its outstanding teaching staff, recently exemplified by foreign language teacher Parthena Draggett who was named Ohio World Language Teacher of the Year. Elected by her peers in the Ohio Foreign Language Association, Mrs. Draggett represented our state at the 17-state, Central States Conference in Minnesota. This award is well deserved, as you will see

Resource Management

Throughout this relentless winter, Jackson Local Schools remained solid in its resolve to be a leader in energy conservation. When we instituted the energy management program in 2010, our goal was to reduce consumption by 25%. We surpassed that goal and are now using 31.5% less energy. This ongoing effort has saved taxpayers more than \$1.85 million to date.

Jackson Local is also diligent about managing its financial resources, making us one of the state's lowest spending, highest achieving districts. Our outstanding Treasurer's Office earned the Auditor of State Award for a fourth consecutive year. Hats off to treasurer, Linda Paris and her team for their accurate record keeping.

Not only do we appreciate the partnerships with local business and government agencies, but also with parents. Jackson's status of 19th of over 600 Ohio districts is achieved with help from the entire community. This time, with LeBron James back on the court, excitement was running high, and it climbed even higher when the choir was asked to form the high five tunnel on the court, in place of a high school team that was caught in traffic. "We were given Cavs T-shirts and sent to the floor to form the tunnel (the one players pass through as they enter the arena). To be on that floor while 20,000 fans cheer for the players was an amazing experience," said Mrs. Grove.


Students perform at Percussion Ensemble Festival

Parthena Draggett teaches Spanish at Jackson High School in Massillon, where she is the World Language Department Head and has taught all levels of Spanish and French. Parthena also serves as a Project Management Team Leader for Stark County World Language Lead Teachers since 2004, and has created model curriculum for the Ohio Department of Education, both for Ohio's New Learning Standards (2012) and our previous standards. She has participated in various OFLA committees over the years, including: Technology, Awards, and Teacher Education and Licensure. A recipient of the OFLA Distinguished Service Award in 2006 and the Technology Award in 2012, her most recent service is as a member of the ODE Network of Regional Leaders, collaborating with teachers across the state.

In addition, Parthena regularly presents at conferences, including: OFLA, ACTFL, AATSP, the AP Annual Conference, and Central States. A long time participant in the AP Spanish Reading, she currently serves as a Table Leader for Writing. A College Board Consultant, she presents AP Spanish workshops and APSIs, represents World Languages on the College Board Consultants' Panel,



has contributed as a writer and editor of materials for the AP Community Online Annotated Resource Guide, and is co-author of the new College Board Thematic Curriculum Module, El arte — ventana y espejo, to be used in AP Spanish Language and Culture AP Summer Institutes. She also participated in preparing sample syllabi for the new AP Spanish Language and Culture Course Audit. A passionate AP teacher, Parthena has been a reviewer and author of several AP Spanish publications, including the AP SPANISH LANGUAGE Quick Study Guide for Bar Charts, Inc.

Moreover, Parthena serves as Treasurer of AATSP Ohio, State Director for the

Sociedad Honoraria Hispánica, and Regional Coordinator for the National Spanish Exam. Parthena has been an AP Spanish Reader since 2006, currently as Table Leader. Parthena regularly contributes to the OFLA Listserv, the AP Community, and FL Teach, making connections with teachers near and far, sharing materials and collaborating.

Parthena earned her B.A. in Spanish and French from Mount Union College and her M.A. in Spanish and French Pedagogy and Applied Linguistics from Kent State University. Among the first National Board Certified Teachers in World Languages Other than English (2002), Parthena currently holds the highest Ohio teaching credentials: Lead Professional Educator License.

In March, she represented Ohio as the state's nominee for the 2015 Central States Conference's regional Teacher of the Year competition in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Parthena is a talented and respected colleague whose accomplishments are outstanding, and whose dedication to teaching is unsurpassed.

Contestants demonstrate their knowledge of math concepts used in the healthcare fields by completing a test that may include the use of ratio/ proportion, dosage calculation, metric and household equivalents, Roman numerals, abbreviations, and general math.

Alexis Hrabovsky - Senior - 2nd place in Medical Terminology. Contestants evaluate the knowledge of medical terminology and abbreviations of an individual preparing for employment in the health fields.

Tyler Weaver - Junior - 3rd place in Automotive. Contestants demonstrate the ability to perform jobs and skills based on the task list outlined by the National



Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) and the National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF). Workstations consisted of on-vehicle, simulations, bench and component testing and a written test.

Mitch Quartz - Junior - 3rd place in Carpentry. Contestants framed walls using wood and metal steel studs, cut and installed rafters, installed sheathing, and demonstrated knowledge of stair construction. Contestants were judged on accuracy, ability to interpret blueprints, workmanship, safety and the proper use of tools and materials.







Grad speaks on global competency

Brad Ayers, a 1994 graduate of Jackson High School, spent a day sharing his experiences in international trade with JHS Spanish students. He urged students to make the connection between their foreign language study and their future success. Mr. Ayers said, "Today's students will compete in



a flat world that will be hyper competitive. Developing global competency now with world language skills, intercultural understanding and a genuine curiosity about how things work outside of the classroom is very important for our national security and future economic development. It is always an honor for me to get the opportunity to share my experiences in international trade, using the Spanish language and my interests in having a global mind-set with students."

Grad is president of Ohio CAR

Anastasia Demor, a 2012 graduate of Jackson High School, is serving as president of the Ohio Society Children of the American Revolution (OSCAR), a subset of the National Society of the Children of the American Revolution. Founded in 1895, it is the oldest patriotic youth organization in the US. Membership in this leadership organization is open to descendents of patriots of the American Revolution.

"Through this organization, my love of patriotism, and love of country has grown. I am proud to be able to say I have at least 12 ancestors that fought in the American Revolution and be able to give the names

of those patriots," Anastasia said. "The organization has helped me understand the importance of family and heritage, to grow as a leader and be truly be proud of where I came from."

As president of the Ohio chapter, Anastasia travels the state, raising funds for the Make-A-Wish Foundation®. She also leads her Ohio members in raising funds to help support the 2014-2015 National President's project-the restoration of the 10 flags that fly outside the Star-Spangled Flag House in Baltimore, Maryland. The Flag House, now a museum, began as the home of Mary Pickersgill, the woman who sewed the Star-Spangled Banner.

Anastasia is a junior at Notre Dame College of Ohio, studying elementary education. She will graduate with a double major as an intervention specialist and as an early childhood education teacher.

Just as she is proud of her patriotic roots, she is proud of her JHS roots. "My education at Jackson High School was a good one. I had experiences I may not have gotten at any other school. I participated in the Career Tech Program, and by doing that, it helped me to skip my freshman level teaching class and jump right into my sophomore level classes," she said.

In addition, they demonstrated Purview, the network optimization software that captures network data and analyzes the ways in which Jackson students are using the district network. The analysis allows our tech team to see bottlenecks and improve in-house network performance as well as efficiently identify problems outside the Jackson network. All of this is to create the best possible learning and testing experience for Jackson students.







Need money for college?

The Jackson Student Loan Association was established to provide low-interest student loans to JHS graduates who have been accepted by a post-secondary school (vocational, two-year or four-year).

Graduates may request up to \$5,000. The loan accrues no interest until a student's education is complete or he/she withdraws. Upon graduation or withdrawal, the note will bear interest on the unpaid balance at the rate commensurate with the Stafford Loan rate on the date the loan agreement was signed.

Students can pick up an application in the high school guidance office or access it through the Jackson Local Web site jackson.stark.k12.oh.us/jhs/guidance/links.html.

The Loan Association has always been run

by a board of local citizens who understand the importance of higher education. It was started in 1955 by the PTA and Mrs. John Hyde, a former JHS teacher. It's first president was John Weisgarber, longtime member of the Jackson Board of Education. Other charter members included Andy Steve, Joseph Stephan, Dr. Howard Smith, Ralph Darragh, Helen Hessin, Ralph Goodman, Kenneth Loessler, and Mrs. Gearald Iceman with legal advisor Willis Grant. Donations from the PTA, graduating classes, and community friends grew the original fund which is currently self-sufficient.
