With 24.5 years in education, Mr. DiLoreto holds a Bachelor of Science in Education with an emphasis in comprehensive social studies and a Master's degree in Education Administration After 14 years of teaching, he began his administrative career as an assistant principal with Massillon City Schools. He joined Jackson Local in 2005 as the JMMS principal, was promoted to director of support services in 2008 and assistant superintendent in 2009. Mr. DiLoreto holds licenses as a Superintendent, Business Manager, and School Treasurer. In an effort to seek a high performing superintendent candidate, the Board of Education utilized the Ohio


School Board Association's (OSBA) search services to assess Mr. DiLoreto's qualifications. Kathy LaSota, OSBA's deputy director for search services, conducted a credentialing process and stated, "Chris has a clear understanding of the role of superintendent in general and a deep and broad understanding of the Jackson Local School District specifically. It is my opinion that his passion and desire to become the District's superintendent, combined with his experience, leadership skills and knowledge, rank him among the best." As superintendent, Mr. DiLoreto pledges to increase student achievement while remaining fiscally responsible. He is dedicated as well to communication and collaboration,

Students create clothing from ethical, sustainable materials

JSA has been the recipient of a threeyear SmArts grant entitled "The Fabric of our Culture." The first year focused on the individual and featured the Kimono Exhibit at the Canton Museum of Art. The second year focused on the Canton Arts Communit at large.

This year, the final year of the grant, the focus was broadened to a global perspective. JSA freshmen researched and wrote three papers addressing the international garment trade, beginning by examining the manufacturing practices of the company that made his or her favorite piece of clothing. Students gained an understanding of where their clothing comes from, who makes it, and under what working conditions.In March, JSA freshmen toured the Kent State University Fashion Museum and Library where they researched a contemporary fashion "look" that they would recreate. Next, they visited the Salvation Army, where students used grant money to purchase items of clothing or household goods that they could use to replicate this "look." They constructed "re-cycled, re-purposed, re-created" outfits to illustrate that ethical fashion does not have to be expensive, or come from the mall. The students displayed their finished creations at the JSA Showcase. This was an exercise in creating something beautiful, useful, and personal from ethical, sustainable materials, tying into the global theme of "The Fabric of Our Culture," said JSA Director Mrs. Susan Gardner.

Due to their lethal arsenal of advanced military and tactical specialties combined with superior physical and mental conditioning, Army Rangers are considered among the world's best, and some consider Ranger the toughest combat course in the world.

Zach is one of the 70 men who finished the training despite sleep/food depravation. He lost 20 pounds during the course that took him from Fort Benning GA. and the Blue Ridge Mountains, to the swamps of Florida alongside venomous snakes, and alligators.
"The course stresses you to the breaking point so that during combat, you can push others through," Zach said, adding that leadership, for him, means his men will trust that he has their best interest at heart and that together they can complete their mission. From conducting classified missions around the world to rescuing American POWs, Rangers are the tip of the spear for American military operations.
Remembering one of his teachers at JHS, physics teacher Paul Dillick, Zach said, "He gave us the freedom to explore projects and be in charge of a team."

## Private funds make stadium turf a reality

Robert Fife Stadium is expected to get artificial turf this fall through a community effort to raise funds comprised of individual and business donations. The committee has secured $\$ 481,000$ with over $\$ 177,000$ additional funds pledged over the next two years. No tax dollars will be used to

complete this project.
The committee also benefited from the tremendous generosity of local businesses that provided over $\$ 200,000$ in in-kind donations. This will allow the committee to get the highest quality field available, constructed by the most experienced companies in the industry. The total cost is just under $\$ 640,000$. a local company, Vasco Sports Construction, will be responsible for the construction. Vasco owners Matt Savage and Mike Vinton are Jackson graduates. The artificial turf will be provided by Sports Construction Group which is also represented by a Jackson grad, Justen Stickley. Jackson will have the same state-of-the-art surface currently being installed at Youngstown State University. Jackson's field will be installed over summer and be ready for our first home football game.
"This was truly a community effort, as we had hundreds of donors contribute from $\$ 50$ to $\$ 25,000$." said Bryan Hartong, co-chair of the Stadium Improvement Committee. The committee is now offering local companies advertisement opportunities inside the stadium, and there is also a campaign which allows citizens to buy a personalized brick for the new stadium entrance.
"This project was a collaborative effort between the Stadium Improvement Committee, Jackson Schools, and the community," said co-chair Jean Furbay. "The project will be realized without relying on any tax dollars. Many said it could not be done without major donors, but we were able to come together as a community and make it happen in a very short period of time."
The multi-purpose field will be utilized by all sports programs as well as the Jackson Marching Band.
"This/stadium will put us on par with other Federal League Stadiums," Mr. Hartong said. "It will also reduce the overall operating cost to the school system since it is much less expensive to maintain artificial turf than the current grass field.".
