Jackson is low-spending, high-achieving

Excellent schools are a great investment

Jackson Local will place a renewal levy on the May 6 ballot. The original five-year levy generated \$6,150,000 annually for the past five years. The renewed levy would generate the same dollars for the next five years. I want to thank Nate Bailey for organizing a Levy Committee that is working hard to educate our community on the value of renewing this levy. I felt privileged to report the following to Nate's team.

We are high-achieving

Our schools have been ranked excellent by the state of Ohio for 12 years. In addition, our district has two nationally recognized Blue Ribbon Schools and a high school ranked by U.S. News and World Report among America's top 1000. Our 2010 Basketball team brought home the district's first Athletic State Championship, and our Speech and Debate Team owns two Academic State Championships (2010 and 2012).

Students have choices

Our schools provide an outstanding K-12 curriculum with options at the high school such as Career Tech, a School for the Arts, an Academy of Global Studies, an International Baccalaureate program, and award-winning band and choir programs. There are also more than 20 varsity sports, dozens of student clubs, and hundreds of after-school events. Last year, there were nearly 1,500 events at our schools.

Our students are successful athletes

The Polar Bears own more than 175 Federal League titles and have won the Federal League All Sports Trophy 12 times, more times than any other Federal League school. Last year's calculations showed that of our 900 high school athletes, 250 earned a 4.0 GPA. Annually, they participate in 850

contests with 153 different schools. Of our 471 middle school athletes, 109 earned a 4.0 GPA. Annually, they participate in 244 contests with 20 different schools, and own 24 Federal League titles.

Our students earn scholarships

Our students' hard work in the classroom and on our playing fields, earns the senior class well over \$1 million in college scholarships each year.

We are low-spending

Our outstanding academic and athletic results are attained even though the district is consistently one of the lowest per-pupil spenders among the Ohio districts most similar to Jackson.

Resource management saves taxpayer dollars



Our district is one of only three in Ohio to earn the Energy Star **ENERGY STAR** Leader Award for instituting

conservation practices that have allowed us to avoid more than one million dollars in energy costs over the past three years. Recently, we received the Pacesetter award for achieving better than predicted efficiency outcomes.

We are good stewards

We make every effort to be good stewards of the public dollar, and I congratulate our Treasurer's Department for its attention to detail. Please see the article at right. Did you know that annually, six state auditors spend 600 hours reviewing our books. That's six sets of eyes making sure your funds are properly handled.

We would not be the district we are without our parent support groups, community partnerships, and the consistent support of our residents. We are proud of our district successes and hope that you are as well.



Jackson receives energy efficiency award

Jackson Local Schools has been working with Cenergistic, a national energy conservation company that helps school districts build customized and sustainable energy conservation programs to save tax dollars.

Recently, Michael Bitar, regional president of Cenergistic, presented the Jackson Local Board of Education with the Energy Pacesetter Award for achieving above average savings. Jackson has achieved a 32% cost savings totaling \$1,329,433 in the 36 months since forming its strategic alliance with Cenergistic.

District receives top technology award



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READING, MATH, WRITING, STUDY SKILLS, ACT/SAT PREP, COLLEGE PREP AND MORE!

On Saturday February 22, at Mahoning Career Center, JHS Career & Technical students participated in the regional SkillsUSA competition. The following students placed 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place in their individual competitions and will advance to the state competition held in Columbus in April.

Garrett Morgner—Senior—2nd place in Computer Maintenance Technology. Contestants identified and repaired computer hardware malfunctions, solved configuration problems, and installed common components. Their score on this exam was used as the basis for the written portion of the contest.

Contestants demonstrated their knowledge of general math concepts used in the healthcare fields. They completed a written test that included the use of ratio/proportion, dosage calculation, metric and household equivalents, Roman numerals, abbreviations, and general math including percentages, among other medical math-related problems.


Students Skype with economist in Spain Señora Draggett's AP Spanish classes experienced a

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
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Careers Day at JMMS

Irene Adler is the daughter of Rose Schwartz, age 92, is Akron's oldest living Holocaust survivor and the first Ohioan to have spoken publicly of the horrors of the German concentration camps. Her daughter, Irene Adler, spoke in her stead to JMMS students who spent the pervious weeks learning about World War II. Students were captivated by Mrs. Adler's direct and vivid description of the atrocities her mother endured personally or saw others endure, including being

stripped naked, shaved, starved, beaten raw, electrocuted, burned with cigarettes, and having teeth and fingernails pulled out with pliers.

Her mother was the only member of her family to have survived, she believes, because she had skills. Mrs. Schwartz spoke seven languages and knew how

"Sewing saved her life," Mrs. Adler said

of her mother who used that skill to survive during the war and make a living afterward.

She implored the students to do two things: learn everything they can, and use their minds to stop the repetition of today's similar atrocities against people.

"Education can save you from a lot of plight," she said. And perhaps you can use your great minds to save others."

The annual contest invigorates learning by having students conduct historical research that leads to imaginative exhibits, documentaries, original performances, Web sites and scholarly papers. 


















MS brings the house down with Little Merma

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

A six-member faculty committee reviewed the nominees and chose seven nationally to receive the award. Mr. Taray received the award at an honorary dinner in February.



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


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
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Amherst students have a lot of heart

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
